HANS ROHLOF, MD, is psychiatrist, psychotherapist and researcher in private practice and at the University of Utrecht, the Netherlands. From 1999 till November 2015 he was affiliated to 'Centrum '45' in

Oegstgeest, the Netherlands: this is the National Institute for Psychotrauma Treatment and Research. Next to his private practice, he is connected as consultant psychiatrist at GGZ Integraal, a psychiatric outpatient service for migrant patients. He is specialised in cognitive behaviour therapy, group therapy and directive treatment methods. He is a certified psychotraumatologist. His specialisation is the diagnosis and treatment of traumatised refugees. He is occupied with the national education of residents in Transcultural Psychiatry, and with several other education programs, nationwide and abroad. He has an affiliation to the University of Utrecht, for research and education. He is Secretary of the Johannes Wier Foundation for Human Rights and Health Care, based in Amsterdam.



ROBERT M. ROHRBAUGH, MD. After completing his undergraduate studies at Franklin and Marshall College, Dr. Rohrbaugh graduated from medical school at Yale where he also completed

his psychiatry residency and geriatric psychiatry fellowship. He then joined the Yale psychiatry faculty where he developed clinical programs at the interface of psychiatry and primary care. He also developed medical education programs, with particular emphasis on ensuring junior residents developed expertise in bio-psychosocial formulation, a skill he has taught Yale psychiatry interns for nearly 25 years. Currently Dr. Rohrbaugh is Professor and Deputy Chair for Education and Career Development in the Department of Psychiatry at Yale. He is the Program Director for the psychiatry residency, the Director of Medical Studies for medical student education and oversees the appointment and promotion processes for psychiatry faculty. Dr. Rohrbaugh been instrumental in developing a Social Justice and Health Equity curriculum in the Yale Psychiatry Residency. One theme in the SJHE curriculum has been the development of experiential programs to understand the structures in the community that act as barriers to health for our patients and how to advocate for change.



MONIKA KARAZJA, MD, MSc, is a fourth year psychiatry resident at the George Washington University Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences. Prior to focusing on mental health, she

was involved in various global health efforts starting in college. These included working in a leprosy hospital in India, visiting infectious disease clinics in Namibia, working

on an inpatient medical unit in Uganda and traveling to Siberia. Through research opportunities offered by the Albert Einstein College of Medicine and mentorship from individuals working at the Mailman School of Public health, she narrowed her focus to global mental health. She was able to complete an elective in community psychiatry in a mental health clinic and training site in Patagonia and extended her medical school training to include a year of research in global mental health with RedeAmericas. Between medical school and residency, she completed her master's degree in global mental health with King's College and The London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. This setting was her first exposure to some of the controversies and conflicts between global mental health and transcultural psychiatry. Dr. Karazja is the 2018 recipient of SSPC's John Spiegel Fellowship Award and will be presenting her award lecture at our conference in April.



KENNETH FUNG, MD, MSc (moderator), is a Staff Psychiatrist and Clinical Director of the Asian Initiative in Mental Health Program at the Toronto Western Hospital, University Health Network. He is also

Associate Professor with Equity, Gender, and Populations Division at the Department of Psychiatry, University of Toronto and President Elect of the SSPC.
